When you have 5 MORE minutes! Read this stuff...

All the day we play.

Play is an important part of our program at ODN. As a parent, you may ask how children learn while they are playing. Through play, children learn things that cannot be easily taught. In play, children are forced to use their minds. They make decisions and solve problems. They figure out how to make things work and how to put things together. They have experiences from painting to hammering nails to reading books that help them learn how to think. Play helps children to understand symbols - like designs and pictures that are needed for reading, writing and arithmetic. Children use words in their play to share thoughts and feelings, and so their language skills develop. Through play, children master control of their bodies. By playing with dolls or blocks or Legos, children are developing hand-eye coordination. By running, climbing and moving to music, they are developing large muscles and becoming physically fit. They learn to get along with others. Children have different ideas when they play. They learn how to listen to others' views, how to lead, and how to follow. They also learn to cope when things don't go the way they planned - for themselves or others. They learn how to solve conflicts with words rather than fits - an important life skill. They learn to get along with others who have backgrounds different from their own. Through play, children learn to control and express their emotions.

It is important for children to feel free to learn without fear of making mistakes. Play allows them to do this. Mistakes are OK to make. We just try to learn from them. Play is more than fun and games. It involves many types of learning and should be a part of every child's life, at school as well as at home. So be sure to have fun playing this summer!

Reading! Who needs to read? Everyone! If your child can write their name they can apply for their own library card. Who needs any other card when you've got a library card??? The Northfield Public Library Summer Reading Program begins soon. The programs take place at the library and are completely free! Hope you will be able to check it out.
